OLPS Homework Guidelines



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Homework provides an opportunity to:

- o practise skills and reinforce learning
- o develop time management strategies
- engage parents in their children's learning.

Outcomes

Students will be able to organise their time effectively, revise work introduced in class and become more independent and responsible for their learning. Parents will have information about the skills taught in class and the depth of their children's learning.

Projects or Other Learning	Additional learning projects may be set during the year. This will be communicated via COMPASS.			

Teacher expectations

- o Teachers set homework regularly, check completion of tasks and provide feedback to the child
- o Teachers check and respond to parents' remarks or questions
- o Teachers set expectations about homework and keep a record of student's homework.
- o Teachers communicate with parents once a child has not submitted homework three times within a term.
- o Teachers follow PBL processes and provide appropriate follow up for non-completion.

Student expectations

- Students are responsible for completing homework set to the standard expected for all class work i.e. clean, legible, neat, well set out.
- o Homework to be handed in by the due date
- Students who don't complete homework 3 times within a term will have communication with home and an appropriate follow up in line with PBL processes.

Parent expectations

- o Parents check homework requirements for students at the beginning of each week
- Stage 2-3 parents sign off on homework each week.
- Early Stage 1 and Stage 1 parents/carers listen to and converse with students about home reading.
- Parents communicate with the class teacher if issues with homework arise or if external commitments impact homework. For example: Speech Therapy, sport. O.T.

Reading is the most important component of the homework policy and should be done daily.

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
